





'Sad day': Senate passes Don't Ask, Don't Tell repeal

WASHINGTON (BP)--In a landmark moment for the homosexual movement, the Senate Dec. 18 sent President Obama a bill overturning the military's Don't Ask, Don't Tell policy, a move that will lead to open homosexuality in the military and will harm religious liberty, readiness, privacy and retention, critics say.

The Senate's 65-31 vote during the lame duck session capped a nearly year-long effort by the Obama administration to reverse the 17-year-old policy, which was adopted in 1993 as a compromise between conservatives and President Clinton, who wanted homosexuals to be able to serve openly

but faced resistance from Congress and the Pentagon. As part of the '93 compromise, homosexuals would not have to disclose their sexuality on the front end -- as had been required -- although they would be required to keep their homosexuality secret while serving.

The U.S. military has never allowed open homosexuality.

Obama urged Congress during his January State of the Union address to reverse the policy, and the Pentagon studied the issue for 10 months before releasing a much-debated survey on the final day of November. Opponents of the current policy rushed to pass the bill during the lame duck session after Republicans -- most of whom supported the current policy -- made significant gains on Election Day. New legislators will be sworn in Jan. 4.

Obama has not said when he will sign the bill. The bill previously passed the House, 250-175.

"This is a very, very sad day for America," Richard Land, president of the Southern Baptist Convention's Ethics & Religious Liberty Commission, told Baptist Press. "It is an honor and a privilege, not a right, to serve in our nation's military. There are multitudes of reasons why the military is the most respected national institution in American life. I have heard from privates and seamen all the way through generals and admirals that this will cause significant numbers of people to resign from the military -- in the middle of two wars."

Technically, the policy won't be repealed even when Obama signs the bill. A complete repeal will require certification by Obama, Secretary of Defense Robert Gates and Joint Chiefs of Staff Chairman Michael Mullen that it won't harm the military. All three, though, supported the bill.

Democratic support carried the bill in both chambers. In the Senate, all 31 "no" votes came from Republicans, and eight Republicans joined 57 Democrats to support it. In the House, 235 Democrats and 15 Republicans voted for the bill, while 160 Republicans and 15 Democrats opposed it. (The Senate vote tally is available at http://ow.ly/3rnp9, the House tally at http://ow.ly/3pU6e.)

Religious liberty was at the forefront of conservatives' concerns. More than 60 retired chaplains had signed a letter to Obama and Secretary of Defense Robert Gates warning that a repeal would marginalize "deeply held" religious beliefs of military personnel and present a conflict when

some chaplains, while preaching, "present religious teachings that identify homosexual behavior as immoral." They warned that changing the policy could influence chaplains not only in what they could preach but in what they could say in a counseling session. A repeal, the letter further said, would harm morale because it would be casting "the sincerely held religious beliefs of many chaplains and Service members as rank bigotry comparable to racism."

Chaplain (Col.) Keith Travis, chaplain team leader for the Southern Baptist Convention's North American Mission Board, told Baptist Press after the Senate vote that "we



intend to remain fully engaged with chaplaincy in the U.S. Military."

"Our primary concern is that our chaplains be allowed to counsel and teach using Scripture in its entirety," Travis said. "It will be interesting to see how the military will balance this new policy with religious freedom."

Already, Christian legal organizations, such as the Alliance Defense Fund, are pledging to defend any chaplains who encounter problems.

"No Americans, and especially not our troops, should be forced to abandon their religious beliefs," Alliance Defense Fund attorney Daniel Blomberg said in a statement. "We hope that our nation's leaders will work to ensure that none of our Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, and Marines are ever made to choose between serving their country or obeying their God as result of this damaging policy decision. And ADF stands ready to defend service members if they are ever unconstitutionally required to make that choice."

The Pentagon's survey of military personnel found significant resistance to a repeal from those serving on the front lines. For example, among those in the Marine combat arms and Army combat arms, 57 percent and 47 percent, respectively, said having an openly homosexual person would negatively impact "how service members in your immediate unit work together to get the job done."

More than a third of Marines (38.1 percent) and nearly a fourth of all personnel (23.7) said they would either leave the military or think about doing so earlier than planned if

the policy is reversed. That number jumped to 48 percent for Marines on the front lines.

Concerns among Marines are part of the reason Marine Commandant Gen. Jim Amos, one of the four service chiefs on the Joint Chiefs of Staff, warned that implementing a repeal during the current war environment could cost lives because it would serve as a distraction.

"Such findings should make it impossible for President Barack Obama, Defense Secretary Robert Gates and Joint Chiefs Chairman Adm. Mike Mullen to 'certify' that no harm will be done by implementation of their own plans for repeal,"

> Elaine Donnelly, president of the Center for Military Readiness, said in a statement. "The president's political promise to LGBT Left groups has been assigned highest priority, at the expense of Army and Marine combat troops whose voices were heard but ignored."

> Privacy, too, was a concern, as a significant number of personnel expressed concern with sharing bathrooms, and open bay showers, with an openly homosexual person. Only 29 percent of all personnel said they would "take no action" if they found themselves in a similar situation.

The New York Times ran a story Dec. 20 that included interviews with Marines in training. "Many said that introducing the possibility of sexual tension into combat forces would be disruptive," the story said.

The day before the Senate vote, Land sent Obama a letter, urging the president to be guided by his Christian faith on the issue.

"We believe it to be contrary to Scripture to commend open homosexual relationships in general, including within the military ranks," Land's letter reads. "Our nation has moved from God in so many ways and we are deeply concerned that an increasingly affirming policy toward homosexual behavior will provide further impetus for God's judgment on our nation."

Land told Baptist Press that the conservative-leaning composition of the military will lead to resignations.

"The reality is that in America today, an all-volunteer military is significantly disproportionately from red-state America," Land said. "And the resignations from the military will be disproportionately from red-state America. So, quite rapidly the military will go from an organization in which homosexuals are underrepresented in ratio to a percentage of the population to an institution where they are overrepresented, which will only accelerate the rate of resignation. Legislators who voted for this disproportionately never served in the military. The opposition was led by legislators who have served."

The eight Senate Republicans who supported the bill were Sens. Olympia Snow and Susan Collins (each of Maine), Richard Burr (N.C.), John Ensign (Nev.), Lisa Murkowski (Alaska), Scott Brown (Mass.), Mark Kirk (Ill.) and George Voinovich (Ohio). The retiring Voinovich is in his final days as a senator.

A New Year Challenge

The New Year brings many challenges and opportunities for spiritual growth. A casual study of the Bible reveals that God does not intend for our spiritual growth to be in a vacuum—in fact growth becomes stagnate in a vacuum—it reproduces by interaction with others.

Here is a true story about challenge and diligence. For all of his seventy-six years, Romanian-born Liviu Librescu met life's challenges head-on. As a child in Romania during World War II, he was confined to a Jewish ghetto while has father was sentenced to a forced labor camp.

But he survived the Holocaust, determined to fulfill his dream of becoming an engineer. And he did, in spite of the Communist Party ruling Romania during his young adult years.

He completed an undergraduate engineering degree at the Polytechnic University of Bucharest and then a PhD at the Institute of Fluid Mechanics at Romania's Academy of Science. He soon

received wide esteem as a brilliant professor—within Romania. Communist rule prohibited him from publishing his research outside of Romania. At great risk, he smuggled his papers out of Romania to publishers in other countries.

After three years of overcoming obstacles, Dr. Librescu and his wife were granted permission to immigrate to Israel in 1978. After teaching at Tel-Aviv University for seven years, he accepted a one year position as a visiting professor in the Virginia Tech (Virginia) Department of Engineering and Mechanics.

In 1958 his family joined him in Blacksburg, Virginia, and they became part of the university family. He became one of Virginia Tech's most popular and respected professors and researchers in the field of aeronautical engineering. Throughout his career, Dr. Librescu compiled a list of awards and recognitions too long to detail here

Although Dr. Librescu was Jewish, for all of his seventy-six years, he exemplified in his life the kind of diligence that reflects the image of God in human beings. Dr. Ishwar Puri, head of Dr. Liebrescu's department at Virginia Tech, said of his colleague, "He loved his position as a professor. A prolific researcher and wonderful teacher, he devoted himself to the profession, solely for the love of it."

When the professor himself was asked, in 2005, whey he continued to work so hard, he said, "It is not a question of organizations or calculations. If I had the pleasure to do this, then I will put time aside to do this. It is personal freedom. If you are limited, then you miss the freedom. And I—I would like to be


fluid. I would like to be free as a bird and fly everywhere."

The way Dr. Librescu lived his life—overcoming obstacles for more than seven decades to give his all to what he loved—would be a lesson by itself in diligence. He continued to teach at Virginia Tech well past retirement age because life itself was a challenge for him. He never gave himself permission to stop as long has his students needed him. In fact, it was his diligence that cost Dr. Librescu his life, and served as the ultimate illustration of what it means to live with no reservations.

On April 16, 2007, when a heavily armed, deranged student entered the classroom buildings on the Virginia Tech campus and began randomly killing and wounding students and staff, Dr. Librescu was teaching a class

of around twenty students.

As soon as it became obvious that the shooter might target his classroom, the seventy-six-yearold professor immediately threw himself against the inside of the



What would make someone sacrifice himself for the sake of others? For Liviu Librescu, it was the culmination of a life of overcoming challenges and remaining diligent to the end. After the attack, a student summarized the professor's actions: "It's one of those things where every little thing you do can save somebody's life."

Dr. Puri, his department head said, "Professor Librescu was an extremely tolerant man who mentored scholars from all over our trouble world. The professor was not a stranger to trouble, but he wasn't intimidated by it. From childhood his commitment to living for others created peace in "our troubled world."

Christians live in the same world. And we are called by God to take up our cross and march into the trouble for the sake of Christ—not knowing but that one little thing we do might save someone's life in time or for eternity.

Our challenge is learning to live an exceptional life—a life of sacrifice, diligence and generous commitment. We learn about such a life in the Bible, and those who read it every day learn how to face life's challenges and impact others with the Gospel. This is a process that never ends.

of work to do in North America, and frankly our time is running out. We believe the most effective way to start new churches is through our existing churches. We really want to see that happen in a major way in the near future."

In an effort to lay a solid foundation for a "church planting movement" the BMAA recently hosted a two-day intensive coaching workshop to train leaders who will serve as coaches to existing and future church planters. The workshop was led by Dr. Steve Ogne, co-author of *TransforMissional Coaching*. Ogne trains leaders from a three-tier approach. He relates it to the three wheels of a tricycle - Assessment, Coaching and Training. Ogne states, "I use a tricycle analogy because while these three things are taking place, you want the entire effort to be moving in a positive direction."

BMA of Texas representative David Pittman, along with other associational leaders and pastors from several states attended the training held Dec. 15-16 in the BMAA Missions Office. Attendees were taught specific skills in listening, visioning and strategizing. Topics also included evangelizing, gathering, shepherding, building community, training, multiplying, assembling, celebrating, leading and managing.

Ogne describes his teaching material as "a holistic approach to coaching that is especially empowering to young and emerging leaders. Rather than telling leaders what to do or how to do it we strongly advocate that coaches utilize the art of listening and asking great questions as an effective vehicle to engage and empower the leader."

Research shows that productivity, skill development, morale and working relationships all improve dramatically when training is combined with coaching. In the business world those with training alone show improvement of around 22%. Those who receive training and the benefit of a coach improve at 86%. A recent Southern Baptist study of 601 planters between 1997-2002 showed that when a coach was involved in a church plant, that plant size doubled in comparison to those who plant without a coach.

The idea of coaching has been utilized in the BMA of Texas Missions Department in recent years with some measureable results. Church planters are assessed, assigned a coach and required to participate in continual training. A missional approach to local church ministry is very important for impacting unbelievers in our communities. Prayer support for all our missionaries: state, national and international is vital. Every member in every BMA church should participate in a church planting movement among BMA churches. This is fundamental to our future impact on the world.

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Sound Advice for Young Preachers

In just over two months I will retire from the pastorate. I will continue to serve where God leads me, but have no plans to pastor again. For the last 57 years I have pastored Baptist churches. Nearly everything I have learned, I have learned the hard way, by making mistakes. Over the years I made note of my mistakes and what I had learned from them. I wrote them down and stored them away. May I share with you, and especially young preachers, some "do's and don'ts" that experience has taught me?

- 1. Behave yourself. Build a life of integrity. Don't live recklessly.
- 2. Prepare yourself. Give God a portion of each day.
- 3. Never be an embarrassment to your church. Dress your best. Be courteous and friendly to everyone.
- 4. When your church members are sick or have a death in their family be there. They will never forget you. If you are not there when they are in trouble, they won't forget that either!
- 5. Don't play the cliques. Treat everyone the same. You are pastor to all, not just a few.
- When visiting the hospital never, never, ask a lady why she is in the hospital. It will save you an embarrassing moment. Pledge your prayers and leave.
- 7. Hospital visits aren't social calls. Don't wear out your welcome. If you sit down they will over estimate the time you stay. If you stand up, they will under estimate the time you stay. Be brief in your visit.
- Guard your heart against pride and jealousy. Be humble and submissive.
- 9. Exercise care in your relationship with the ladies of your church.
- 10. Pay your bills! Cut up all your credit cards. If you don't have the money to make a purchase, save for it!
- Develop and maintain a close relationship with God. Spend time with Him.
- 12. Cultivate a good sense of humor. Laugh at yourself and laugh with others.

Later, some of those athletes will gain the attention of a professional scout, and before they know what's happening, they're signing up to play for a team for unreal amounts of money. High schools are spending into the hundreds of millions of dollars for sports

complexes and stadiums while the arts, sciences, music and languages take a lower tier of importance.

Even in Christian institutions, one only needs to compare the sports budget with that of the Bible department and conclude something in our society has gone awry.

Something is woefully amiss when a football jock signs a \$150,000 million contract for five years to chase a ball down a field while a New Testament or Old Testament professor teaches precepts that have eternal value and

Something is also woefully amiss when an institution of higher learning places far more value on how far the team makes it in conference play – because after all, the farther they advance, the more income the school will reap from its concessions – while emphasis on the Bible is diminished more and more with each passing year.

consequences for less money than a plumber earns.

Something is woefully amiss when a national renowned sports figure goes to prison for participating in an interstate dog-fighting ring, and comes out and resumes his football career without missing a beat. But let a pastor or denominational leader have an indiscretion in his life and he's pretty much done in the ministry.

One other issue that illustrates how out of kilter our society has become is when we see local sports fields crawling with little league and pee wee football teams – while parents sit in lawn chairs on the sidelines watching them on Wednesday nights. There was a day when no organization in the community would dare trifle with the church's schedule.


Those days have gone by the wayside. To borrow

an old movie title and adapt it a little, we've become a "mad, mad, mad, mad world of sports."

I would venture to say that more people today have a greater knowledge of the batting averages of top baseball players than how many Christians are in America today.

And of course, the electricity that is felt in a giant stadium by 100,000 screaming fans is considered the norm, but let someone get happy in the Lord in church, and they're fanatics.

To salve our consciences, we light-heartedly referred to the Apostle Paul as a sports fanatic, because he obviously frequented the Isthmian Games held in ancient Greece which were held in honor of the pagan seagod Poseidon, because he seemed to glean many of his illustrations from those games. He even refers to shadow boxing in 1 Corinthians 9:26; "I therefore so run, not as uncertainly; so fight I, not as one that beateth the air."





I believe it's clear that Paul saw through the superficiality of the games. He referred to that corruptible crown that the athlete strove for – which was nothing but dried wild celery stalks – and it was all in honor of a false god.

But Paul used the analogy of the believer's walk as including keeping their bodies in subjection to Christ, just as the athlete disciplines his or her body – knowing that when believers crossed the finish line, they would receive an incorruptible crown – a crown that would shimmer throughout eternity. Five-thousand years from today, those wild celery stalks used for crowns for winning athletes will have been incinerated. Five thousand years from today, none of us will remember who won Super Bowl 44 – but we will continue to bask in the victory Christ gave us over death and hell.

Now I'm not saying "ignore a good ball game on TV – or even go see one in person when possible – but let's focus on what really matters in life.

Repent!

Date: January 9, 2011

Text: Jeremiah 3: 6, 10; 4: 14-19, 22.

Lesson in Brief: God's desire is for His people to turn from their sin and idolatry to Him. God offered repentance to sinful Israel, and He promised, if they would turn from their sins, He would bring them back to Zion. The message to the nation of Judah from Jeremiah was that their sin would have a price as well. Turn your heart to God to avoid a similar judgment.

The prophet Jeremiah, whose name means, "Jehovah establishes" is known as the "weeping prophet." He ministered to Judah for 40 years, through five kings. The focus of his prophecy was to urge Judah not to follow the path that led to Israel's (the northern kingdom) fall.

Jeremiah 2:19, "Thine own wickedness shall correct thee, and thy backslidings shall reprove thee..." Sin had caused Israel to be divided, and the northern tribes to be carried off in captivity to the Assyrians. Yet, though sin had caused so much grief, God is still interested in their redemption. God is stating through Jeremiah Judah's need to return in full devotion to Him before sin costs them too high a price.

A plea for Repentance (3:6-25, 4:14). Judah had succumbed to the identical sin of their northern brethren, the worship of false gods. God says, " You watched Israel commit idolatry, you witnessed the judgement that befell them, yet you did the same thing." Judah had continued to disregard the Lord's word and warning (verse 10).

A second appeal is given in Jeremiah 4:14, "O Jerusalem, wash thine heart from wickedness, that thou mayest be saved. How long shall thy vain thoughts lodge within thee?" Jeremiah cries out to Jerusalem to repent and be saved. It is as if he is saying, why can't you see why this trouble is coming? They imagine a vain thing. They appear to be caught up in their own values, overlooking the needs of others. God wants man to be saved so badly, that He sent His only Son to save us.

God's grief over his wayward people (3: 19-25). The Lord intended good for Judah, but she would have none of his blessings. Jeremiah compared Judah to an adulterous wife who dealt treacherously with her husband (verse 20). The prophet likened Judah to a rebellious son, and his Father pleaded with the rebel offspring to return to his Father's house and receive the healing of the Lord (verse 22).

A Promise of Punishment (4:14-19, 22). God told Jeremiah to sound the trumpet of alarm and judgment over the land, because a mighty nation from the north would soon serve as God's instrument of judgment upon Judah (verses 5-9). The neo-Babylonians may be performing the physical battle, but it is really God Himself who has come against Judah.

Jeremiah is grieved over the news of the imminent destruction of the capitol. Yet, the populous seemed oblivious to the pending disaster, as shown in Jeremiah 4:22, "For my people [is] foolish, they have not known me; they [are] sottish children, and they have none understanding: they [are] wise to do evil, but to do good they have no knowledge." The word "sottish" means silly or fool. These are children, who have made foolish decisions. They have chosen dumb idols over the true God. They have gone out of their way to sin. These are a people whose understanding is darkened. They had the Light of the world, and chose darkness over Light.

Application: We must learn from history. How gracious and loving is God! Though we forsake Him, He pleads for our return. The confrontation of our sin is often uncomfortable and awkward. But it is a show of mercy that God is reaching out to us trying to spare us. God knows the horrible consequences of sin to us and our loved ones. He stretches out His hand to rescue us in His love and compassion. There are those who have turned from God. They may be keeping up appearances as Judah did, but God knows our hearts. He is appealing to us, urging us to be restored to Him.

It is strange that we are so slow to respond to God's loving-kindness. Perhaps that is because we don't want to admit our sin and repent of it. In Jeremiah 2:24, God compares us to wild donkeys who won't return until we're ready. God requires that we confess our sin and turn from it (Proverbs 28:13). There is nothing that we can do to free ourselves from the bondage of sin. All that we do to hide it and justify it only makes matters worse. The only reasonable alternative is to seek the forgiveness and cleansing from God. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us" (1 John 1:9-10).

God wants a personal relationship with us. Everything He does is to counter what sin has ruined. It is never too late to repent of sin, receive the forgiveness of God, and live for Him.

A Ride in the Hearse

Date: January 16, 2011 **Text:** Lamentations 5

Lesson in Brief: The momentary enjoyment of sin is never worth the price tag it carries. Sin not only affects us, it affects all those around us. Sin is a matter that we cannot allow ourselves to take too lightly. Jeremiah's sorrow over Judah allows us to see this like no other book in the Bible.

Lamentations, which means wailing, great mourning, or weeping, was written by the prophet Jeremiah soon after the horrible destruction and captivity of Jerusalem by the Babylonians led by King Nebuchadnezzar in 586 B.C. Jeremiah, a person who had deep feelings about his people, and one who greatly loved his native land, graphically details the consequences of Judah's continued rebellion against God. Lamentations symbolically describes the sorrow the nation of Judah experienced in Babylonian captivity. Jeremiah, an eyewitness to the fall of Jerusalem, proclaims that Judah's bondage was the consequence of her sin.

Chapter 5 presents a prayer for mercy and deliverance, and records the prayers of Judah's survivors for God to remember their plight. The underlying theme of the last chapter of this sad book is the hope of restoration through heartfelt confession.

The High cost of Sin (5:2-15). Jeremiah recounts on behalf of the people the tragedy they have encountered. God used the leadership of Moses and Joshua to drive other nations out of the land because of their wickedness, giving it to the Israelites "as their inheritance" but the inheritance has now reverted to its previous inhabitants. He showed himself in the past to be a God who "defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow", but now he has brought this fate on his own children.

Political costs (5:2, 5, 6, 8). The Promise Land was now the barren land. A kingdom of peace was now a persecuted kingdom. A proud nation was now a pitiful nation. A free nation was now a nation of slaves and servants.

Personal costs (5: 3, 10, 14). Pathetic orphans. Physical hunger. Personal abuse. Public disgrace. Painful burden. Personal freedom.

Economic costs (5:4, 9). Paying a premium for necessities (such as water). Gained bread (food) by placing their lives in jeopardy.

Spiritual costs (5:15). The joy of salvation was gone. The privilege of worship was removed. The fellowship of God's people as absent.

The people admit that their tragedy was a result of pursuing a life without God. Verse 7 suggests that they are still "in denial" to some degree about their present state. This is not their fault; their ancestors sinned, but they are suffering for it. It reflects a common human reaction. Somebody else's crimes always seem worse than our own. Some other car was going faster than ours, but the traffic cop has pulled us over.

Repentance and renewal. There is a momentary turn toward repentance in verse 16.

They admit that God's chastening is a proper judgment for the sins of their fathers. Jeremiah did not blame his forefathers for his own sin, but assigned the afflictions of his people to their sins against God. Confession of sin is the key to forgiveness.

The lament closes with a **prayer of hope** that God would restore them to their days of old. As the Israelites found out, sin always fails to deliver on its promises. Sin lures us with the promises of lasting joy and satisfaction, but all it is able to deliver is a temporary joy and it robs us of all that makes life truly worth living.

Lamentations stands as a reminder that the path of sin and disobedience leads us away from God toward destruction and heartache. The road toward God brings peace, joy, contentment and eternal life. The question we all need to ask is, "What path are we currently traveling? Is it worth the cost?"

Someone tells the story of a boy who was rebelling against his dad constantly. This boy was destroying his own life by his rebellion, but he refused to heed his father's words.

One day, the dad said to the boy, "I want to show you what you're doing to your life. I'm going to put a wooden post in our front yard. Every time you rebel, I will put a nail in this post. Every time you obey, I will pull out one nail."

The first thought from the boy was, "I'm going to do everything I can to fill that post with nails." And he did. In two months' time, he filled that post with nails. But he also began to feel the damage he was doing to his own life and to his parents' lives

With true remorse, the boy began to obey his father. One by one, the nails came out. When the last nail came out of the post, the boy broke down in tears. The dad asked, "Son, why are you crying?"

And the boy replied, "I got rid of the nails, but I can't get rid of the holes."

God the Father saw the nails and the posts of our lives, and He saw our helplessness against sin. So He sent His only Son, Jesus Christ, to gather the nails and the posts from those who would let Him. And because of His love for us, Christ allowed Himself to be nailed on the posts, where He willingly paid the consequence of our sin.

Romans 6:23 tells us, "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." And this gift comes with God's Spirit to train us to live holy lives.

The Book of Lamentations

- 1. Begins with disaster.
- 2. Ends with honest and hopeful petitions.
- 3. In the middle reminds us of goodness (Lamentations 3:22-23).

We need to listen clearly to Jeremiah's message, for it gives us a timeless warning, "Sin can never deliver what it promises." God is the only one that can deliver lasting joy and contentment.
