It is a new year. There is always a little bit more of optimism in the new year. Last year is history, and there is a potential for things to be different this year. Most Americans set New Year's resolutions. Things to do to make improvements in their personal life in the upcoming year. The last article I wrote was why we fail at achieving those goals, and how to have success. Some of you have already stopped working on your new year's resolutions. It was that hot fudge sundae that did it, right? Ha!

I encourage you to set some New Year's resolutions in an area that most people never consider. That is in the area of spiritual growth. People will set physical goals of losing weight, exercising, or getting into shape. They may set financial goals like curbing spending, or becoming less in debt. Still others may want to improve their education by taking a class on line, or reading some challenging books. But most people when I ask them; never set spiritual goals for the New Year. How much do you want to grow in the next year in your spiritual walk? What will you do this year to help you look more like Jesus by the next year? If I want to be closer and draw nearer to God; how do I accomplish this? For Christians, this should be critically important. We should always go about assessing our walk with the Lord, and finding new desires and dedication and discipline to grow towards the Son.

Here are some areas to set as New Year's resolutions for your spiritual growth and change.

1. Encourage others – I Thessalonians 5:11, "Wherefore comfort yourselves together, and edify one another, even as also ye do." Edify means to build up. We should build others up. If we want to be more like Jesus this year, if we want to let our light shine before others to give God glory, then a sure fire way of doing it is to become an encourager. We live in

a dreadful, depressed and demonic society. People gravitate to those who encourage them. You can help many others find hope in Jesus by following the scripture admonition to encourage. It will take a little work for most of us. It doesn't always come easy. Remind yourself daily with a note, a memo in your cell phone etc... to find someone to encourage each day. It may be a co-worker, a stranger at a store or someone in your home. Family members are excellent choices for encouragement. I always tried to find one thing to do or one thing to say each day to encourage each of my children. If we don't actually set our minds to this task; then there will be several days go by where we forget. Set this as a goal. Once a day – encourage someone.

2. Witness to others. Romans 1:16 "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." Set a goal for how many people you want to witness to this year. It should be a number that pushes you, but it should also be reasonable. I didn't say set a goal of how many people will accept Christ as Savior that you witness to. Your job is to witness and tell people that Jesus saves. It is up to them and Jesus whether or not they accept the gift of grace. This always helps Christians grow in their faith. The main reason is because the Spirit of the Lord is really on you when you witness. His power is working through you. It keeps you excited about the gospel to witness. It forces you to study the Bible when you witness. It gives you bold utterance of the gospel. All of these things will cause you to grow and be in personal revival, whether or not the person you are witnessing to accepts Jesus or not. We pray they do. But you are simply a tool in the hand of the Lord to accomplish His will. We don't win people to Christ. Jesus does the winning. We just are willing and available as vessels for Christ to use in the process.

You could witness to 12 people in the coming year (that is just one a month). There may not be one of them that you are aware of that accepts Christ. But you still will have done as the Lord commanded us to. And in the process of witnessing, you can't help but grow and be more on fire. That is what happens to us when we witness.

Don't worry about what to say. Just go and tell. The Holy Spirit will give you the words to say. Pray beforehand and ask the Holy Spirit to give you the courage, desire and words to witness. Ask in Jesus name and it will be done. You don't have to be a seminary graduate to witness. God will give you the ability because He desires this to be done. Witnessing is about availability more than ability. Don't worry if they reject the message. You threw seeds of truth out. Who knows, but years later those seeds, coupled with someone else throwing seeds out, may all come together and bear fruit. Romans 8:28. How many times a month do you witness to someone about Jesus? I Peter 3:15.

3. Serve others. Matthew 25:40. We must serve others. Every Christian needs a ministry. Write out an action plan. At least once a month, you need to do something in the community or in the church serving others. If you already do this, then set a goal this year of doubling up on your efforts. Jesus needs Christians ministering to others in a lost and dying world. What are your spiritual resolutions for the New Year?

Pastor, Granddaughter, Killed In I-30 Wreck

Associate Pastor Oak Park, Little Rock, Arkansas

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (Baptist Trumpet)—New Year's night, the family of David Harris, who has served as pastor of Oak Park, Little Rock since 1976, was involved in a tragic traffic accident. He, his wife (Christy), son (Paul) and grandchildren (Maci and Caleb)—had been to the airport to pick up his daughter (Beth) and were on their way home. Paul and Beth were in the front seat, Bro. David and Christy in the

middle seat and Maci and Caleb were in the back seat.

On the way home, around 8:30 p.m., they came up on a wreck on Interstate 30 near Scott Hamilton Drive in Little Rock. Paul, who was driving, slowed down as he approached and passed the accident. As they cleared the accident debris, the car was rear-ended by a car going at a high rate of speed. This caused the Harris car to hit a guardrail and then be struck again by the same car.

First responders were on the scene within minutes and paramedics began working on Bro. David immediately and continued as they traveled to the hospital, but were unable to get a heartbeat. His 10-year-old granddaughter, Maci Harris-who received Christ as her Savior at GMA Camp last year (2012)—

died of her injuries around 12:30 the next morning.

The other four in the car were transported to area hospitals. Beth was treated and released the same night. Paul had several broken ribs on his right side and his lung was also bruised. He was released from the hospital on Friday. Christy Harris was diagnosed with bruised lungs and a broken arm and

at this time is still being treated at the hospital.

Caleb, 10, was diagnosed with a broken leg and several fractures to his sinus cavity. He underwent surgery to repair damage to his leg and was released from the hospital. He also had an outpatient surgery to repair damage to his sinus cavity and is continuing to recover at home.

It was later learned that the vehicle that hit the Harris car was the same one that caused the first accident where a twomonth-old baby, Robert Cecola, Jr., of Texas, was killed. Both accidents are still under investigation.

Bro. David loved his Lord, his family and his church more than any of us will ever know. He was a true testament of unconditional love. We intend to honor him by loving each other and by keeping our faith in the One he taught us so much


Bro. Harris was saved in 1965 and surrendered to the ministry in 1966. His first pastorate was Union Valley, Beebe, Arkansas where he was ordained in 1968. He also pastored Central, Trumann and Ridgecrest, Jonesboro before accepting the pastorate of Oak Park in 1976.

Survivors include his wife of 44 years, Christine Harris; his father, Leo Harris; a son, Paul Harris; a daughter, Beth Harris; a brother, Gene Harris; and four other grandchildren.



Preaching the Word to the Arabic Word

"Life is not safe, but Jesus saves." Have you heard it before? Most of you have not experienced growing up in a country where Muslims make up 99 percent of the population, but aren't you glad that the Word of God is infallible truth!

What Joel prophesied in the ninth century B.C. is happening today: "And it shall come to pass that everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved." (Joel 2:32)

I was saved at the age of 13 when a Lebanese Baptist preacher came to my home city of Baghdad. That's when I heard that "Jesus saves." At age 14, I was baptized in a Baptist Church in Amman, Jordan, and began to see my faith and the faith of others grow during tribulations with the comfort that Jesus has overcome the world.

In 2000, I met my wife, Jenny, at a small group (underground) Bible study in Baghdad. (She and her mother were baptized in a bathtub in their home.)

The home churches and cell groups continued to grow rapidly and, in 2003, the Lord visited His people and the First Baptist Church in Baghdad was dedicated in January 2004. Jerry Kidd and another BMA missionary (editor's note: name withheld for security reasons) came to Baghdad preaching the good news, and since then, over 400 people have been saved and baptized.

Several home churches have started in the Northern part of Iraq among the Assyrians, Caledonians and Kurds. Besides being the youth pastor at the First Baptist Church in Baghdad, I also served with the Baptist Publications in Iraq. In four years, we distributed 51,000 Bibles in hospitals, orphanages and to churches that needed Bibles. It was the most basic need, and it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes. With this said, the enemy of goodness wasn't happy!

In 2007, Jenny and I came to America. Seven weeks later, Jenny gave birth to our firstborn baby, John. I attended the BMA Seminary in Jacksonville. As a foreign student studying the original Bible languages (in a foreign language), I was concerned that I would not make it, but I wasn't aware that God had a bigger plan for our lives.

I knew that Christianity was not the fastest growing religion in America anymore, and I found out later there are 79 million Arabic-speaking people in America. How could they hear the good news without a preacher?

For the next two years, while I was still a student, Jenny and I made monthly trips to another state, taking the gospel to a small population of Arabic-speaking people. We saw Arabs come to know Jesus and become disciples.



Those two years served as a period of preparation for a bigger task and bigger harvest in Dallas — one of the largest ethnic cities in America and the fastest growing metroplex (population-wise) in America.

The ministry among the Arabic-speaking people in Dallas started as a "parachute drop" — we began the ministry without a team of workers to help us. We just obeyed the call, began making contacts and moved to plant the seed for an Arabic congregation. We had a vision to plant an Arabic-speaking church called Living Word Arabic Church, where the Word comes alive. We knew "it is not by might nor by power, but by the Spirit of the Lord of hosts."

Living Word became the first fruit of an Arabic church planting movement in America. Our burden is that the Arabicspeaking people come to know Jesus and be disciples who also make disciples. God granted us our desire as we saw over 80 Arabic-speaking people confess Jesus as Lord and Savior in 2012. We have an average attendance of 50 every Sunday night and they are mostly from Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Egypt and Syria.

We meet at Northside Baptist Church in Garland. Because the Dallas-Fort Worth (DFW) Metroplex is so big, we also have cell groups that meet in homes during the week. Small groups and disciple-making are the heart of our church, and these home groups develop new leaders.

The DFW Metroplex has a population of over 6 million and over 100,000 of those are Arabic-speaking people. Many of the people we serve are refugees. According to the humanitarian and charity organizations, new Arab refugees will be coming soon from Syria, Egypt and Libya. That fact maximizes the need and produces more opportunity!

Arabic is the mother tongue for 22 countries around the globe and is the sixth most commonly spoken language in the world today. With a city like Dallas, where there are many American mega-churches, you may be surprised at how lost and unreached the Arabic speaking people are. Therefore, we have been praying and investigating the

possibility of Arabic Christian broadcasting in the DFW area.

We believe the harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few and the time is short. Please pray for these major points as we seek God's guidance and vision for 2013:

- Pray for more salvations and spiritual growth at Living Word Arabic Church in Dallas and for our small groups.
- Pray for the training of Christian leaders and for disciple-making among the Arabs (multiplication).
- Pray for the Arabic church plant in North America (movement). And for American churches to host Arabic congregations.
- Pray for Arabic video broadcast beside the weekly broadcast www.AshrafSara.com at sermonaudio.com.
- Pray for laborers among Arabs and the process and methodology of coaching them.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSONS

A Heart for God

By GARY HOUSE

DATE: Jan. 20, 2013 **TEXT:** 1 Samuel 16:1, 6-13

LESSON IN BRIEF: God uses people who have a heart that trusts in Him.

The quest for Journey into Greatness shifts from Joshua, a humble servant who assumed responsibility and led God's people in claiming the promises of God, to David, a simple peasant who rose to royalty. David's whole-hearted trust in God enabled God to use him for His glory.

A DEMAND (16:1)—There is a demand for a new King of Israel. Why did God reject Saul as King of Israel? Basically Saul is a proud man who turns out to be stubborn, impetuous, with a strong self-will. These character flaws lead to his downfall. Because of his deliberate disregard for God's Word and his inability to place himself completely under divine control, the Lord ends up taking the royal monarchy from Saul. God tells the aging prophet Samuel, "Quit grieving over Saul, get up and go anoint the One I have chosen."

A DIRECTION (16:2)—God directed the steps of Samuel in anointing a new king. At first, Samuel objects, thinking, "If Saul hears of this, he will consider it treason and I shall be killed." God told Samuel to take the heifer to the house of Jesse and tell him he had come to sacrifice. God said, "I will show you whom you should anoint."

The most important part of this entire narrative is the activity of $\mbox{\sc God}.$

- 1. It was the Lord who rejected Saul as king.
- 2. It was the LORD who told Samuel to go to Jesse in Bethlehem.
- 3. It was the LORD who told Samuel how to keep his mission secret from Saul.
- 4. It was the LORD who did not look on outer appearance but on the heart.
- 5. It was the LORD, who when David was brought before Samuel, said, "Arise, anoint him, for this is he." God is the one behind the scenes, directing the appointment of a new king

A DIMENSION (verses 6-7)—The Lord gave Samuel the proper dimensions of Israel's new king: "When [Jesse's sons] came, [Samuel] looked on Eliab and thought, 'Surely the LORD's anointed is before him.' But the LORD said to Samuel, 'Do not look on his appearance or on the height or his stature, because I have rejected him. For the LORD sees not as man sees: man looks on the outward appearance, but the LORD looks on the heart.'"

When Samuel saw Eliab, the eldest of Jesses's sons, he knew instantly he had found the anointed one. From the reaction of Samuel he must have really looked the part of a king. Like most of us, Samuel looked at the oldest son and assumed he was the one God had chosen. He was wrong. Saul was the kind of man Israel wanted for its king. The oldest son of Jesse was probably something like Saul in terms of age, height, and strength. Saul was a man who was physically dominating - he stood head and shoulders above his countrymen (1 Samuel 9:2), but his heart was not inclined toward the Lord. This time God would appoint a man whose heart was rightly inclined toward him. The outside appearance isn't the all-important dimension; the heart is. When we look at people, do we often not have a tendency to pull a "Samuel" and judge by outward appearance? The heart, not the outer appearance, is really what matters. Do we judge too quickly by outward appearances?

A DECISION (verses 11-13).—The Lord made an important decision. After all Jesse's sons have been brought before Samuel, "he said to Jesse, 'Are all your sons here And he said, 'There remains yet the youngest, but behold, he is keeping the sheep.' And Samuel said to Jesse, 'Send and get him, for we will not sit down till he comes here.' And he sent and brought him in. Now he was ruddy and had beautiful eyes and was handsome. And the LORD said, 'Arise, anoint him, for this is he.' Then Samuel took the horn of oil and anointed him in the midst of his brothers."

Finally, David comes in from the field sees his brothers all dressed up, everybody's standing around. David has on his shepherds garb and still smells like sheep. And God basically says to Samuel, "There, he's the one!"

The prophet of God comes over to him, pours oil on his head, it runs down the back of his neck and says, "You're the next King." And I think David may have said, "Huh?" What an unexpected, unorthodox, unanticipated choice! Here is a boy that nobody seemed to notice. Yet, God did, because God doesn't look at the outward appearance but on the heart.

David is such an unlikely candidate in human terms—a young shepherd boy—that his father hadn't even bothered to call him in from tending the sheep. But when he finally turned up God was unequivocal: "Rise and anoint him; he is the one. He is the one..." David is the one.

God has given the people the best possible earthly king that they could have. He was not perfect, but ultimately he was a man whose heart was devoted to the Lord,

God does not see people as the world does. That David would be anointed Israel's next king would not have been the world's choice. Too young, no combat experience, no education, a sheep herder! But in the mind of God, impressed not by brawn or brains but by a heart completely His, it made perfect sense. God shows us through the choosing of David that someone that evidently was unnoticed by man, had great worth to God.

Four qualities in David that prompted God to select him as King (These qualities set a standard for us):

- 1. David possessed a heart of dependence on God Psalms 62:6-8
- 2. David also had a heart of obedience for God. Psalms 40:8 Psalms 119: 1
- 3. David possessed the heart of a servant $\mbox{\sc Psalms}$ 89:20
- 4. David possessed a heart of integrity psalms 78:72

The people have learned a lesson—a worldly king is not the solution to their problems. So God gives them a king who is different from Saul in two very significant ways. First, he is not an obvious choice from a human point of view, and second, he has a heart that is right with God.

Defeating Giants

DATE: January 27, 2013 **TEXT:** 1 Samuel 17:1-51

LESSON IN BRIEF: "You are from God, little children, and you have conquered them, because the One who is in you is greater than the one who is in the world" (1 lohn 4·4)

Have you ever faced something so big, a problem, a trial, a difficulty, that it seemed impossible to overcome, insurmountable. It was/is your giant. No not literally a 9 ft., ½ inch tall person. Your giant may be a sickness (like cancer), depression, worry, fear, an addiction, a habit, an attitude, a sin, financial trouble, failing marriage, broken relationship, a lawsuit or unemployment. Difficulties in life are inevitable.

While difficulties in life are inevitable, your response to those difficulties is optional.

DEFEAT, DISMAY AND DESPAIR (verse 11)—Every day the Israelite army, including King Saul and David's three oldest brothers, would run in fear back to their camp. In their eyes there was no way they could defeat Goliath, he was an impossible problem.

DETERMINATION, DECISION (verse 26)—David wasn't going to hear any of it. He wasn't going to let this giant insult God and God's people. He wasn't going to live in fear. He was going to defeat the giant. He was going to face the problem head on, and deal with it right away, not on his own strength but by God's might.

Let's face it. Goliath was a big guy. He was huge. His head was almost as high as a basketball goal. The armor he wore weighed 125 pounds, probably more than David did. He was huge. Saul and the other soldiers looked only at the giant. They looked at the obstacle and responded with fear.

David was different. When he looked at Goliath, he didn't see an obstacle. He didn't see a giant. He looked and saw an opportunity for God to work, so David responded with faith.

David and the soldiers both looked at the same situation, but they saw completely different things. David shows us that we need to face our giants head on, and step out in faith believing God will help us overcome our giants, whether that means eliminating them, or helping us to bear the burden so they no longer have a grip on our life

The enemy wants us to live in fear of the giants in our life. He wants us to think our problem is so big that it is impossible even for God to overcome. Yet what did Jesus say?

"For nothing is impossible with God" (Luke 1:37—

GUIDELINES FOR GIANT KILLERS—If you want to be victorious in life, if you want to be used in a mighty way, if you want to make a difference, there are several guidelines you must follow

1. Face the problem. Don't run away or get sidetracked. When we face giant problems in our life, we tend to do the same thing the Israelite army did. We become so overwhelmed by our problem that we tend to run from it or ignore it because we are either afraid of it or we don't know what to do about it. Unfortunately, our problems rarely go away on their own, when we run or ignore them, instead they have a tendency to get bigger, and every day the problem seems more intimidating than the day before.

Sometimes the most courageous thing we can do is turn away from people who are sidetracking us, and face the real issue, the real problem, the giant with courage.

2. Ignore the doubters—Most of us would have gotten ticked off at being falsely accused by our big brother and wasted our time defending ourselves or blasting him back getting in a heated argument over a trivial issue. Instead David wisely ignored him and turned to face the real issue, the giant who was insulting God's people, and therefore God himself.

If you decide to take a stand for God, if you decide to take a stand of faith and to take God at His word, some people will question your motives. They will question your

spirituality and your heart. If you live differently than they do, some people will attack you out of jealousy. Ignore them

God chose Saul and set him as king over God's

people. Saul was a giant of a man, prepared to fight other giants. On the day Goliath came, however, Saul was unable to stand before Goliath because God's spirit had left him. He once trusted and obeyed God. Now, he's a backslidden shell of what he used to be.

So how did Saul respond when Goliath came? He,

So how did Saul respond when Goliath came? He, with his troops, trembled in fear. How did he respond when David was brought before him? He tried to discourage and dissuade David. He told him it couldn't be done.

If you want to be victorious, if you want to make a difference, if you want to slay the giants in your life, ignore the naysayers.

3. Review the Victories (verses 34-37).—When a giant confronted David, David reviewed the victories. He looked back at how God had been faithful in the past. He said, "God helped me when a lion attacked me. He gave me victory when a bear attacked me. If God protected me then, if He helped me then, He will help me now." David reviewed the victories.

When struggles come, when hard times approach, review the victories. Review the times God has been faithful in the past. Review the times He has answered your prayers and taken care of you in the past. Review the victories

- 4. Use your own God given abilities and skills. Never assume that what worked for somebody else to defeat their giant will automatically work for you.
- 5. Trust the Lord (verses 37, 45-46). When David went to fight Goliath, he didn't trust his own strength. He didn't trust his own ability. He didn't trust in his own planning. He trusted the Lord. He said in verses 45-46, "I come against you in the name of the Lord. The Lord will hand you over to me."

It isn't you that will defeat that giant. It isn't you that will win the victory. It is God. Jesus Himself said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." Trust the Lord. Trust that He knows what's best. Trust that what He leads you into He will lead you through. Trust the Lord.

6. Get to it (verse 48). If you have a situation to handle, if you have a problem to deal with, if you have a giant in front of you, then get to it. Put actions to your words

David trusted God so strongly, so confidently, that verse 48 tells us that he ran toward the giant. He didn't hang back hoping things would work out. He charged the situation. He looked forward to seeing God work.

There are those who would say, "Well we need to wait and pray about this. We need to pray that God will strike this giant down." Well, sometimes God works like that, and sometimes, after praying, God expects you to get on with it, and to trust Him to use and work through

David didn't jump out there in his own strength. He ran out there because he trusted God and because he was led by God to do so.

Don't sit around whining about the giants in your life, if you're doing nothing to help the situation. There's a time for praying and a time for doing. Get to it! Don't sit there and kid yourself by thinking about what you're going to do one day. Dear friend, God can and will defeat the giants in your life. He will give you victory, if you get to it.

What is the giant in your life today? What difficulty are you facing today? Will you today, step out and say, "God, I will trust you?" What giants are you facing in our life? What giants seem so big you can't imagine how they can possibly be overcome? Don't run, don't be afraid, face the issue because with God's help you can overcome it. Nothing is impossible with God. Are your eyes focused on the problem or are your eyes focused on God? What steps are God inviting you to take today or this week to step out in faith and overcome your giant by God's might?
